July should be in Goathland at 5.35 on Friday, also to Jno[John] White enclosing letter to Fosters asking permission to shoot on the Egton Estate. 27 Wed[nesday]. Wrote to A.S. Woodward. Received Test[imonial] from Miall which I sent to Typewriters also one from Atkinson. Miall wrote "I am not personally acquainted [115]

with Mr Etheridge". Drafted my application. Sent James for the Camera from No[number] 25 Gertie spent the afternoon &[and] evening at Ashville. Bought Y &[and] ferule 1[shilling]/from Linsleys and Schultz powder from Slingsby. 28. Thur[sday]. Rose and I had tea &[and] spent evening at Fallowfield while there I drafted application for the Australian Post. [116]

July Took matter for cover to testimonials to Jowett &[and] Sowry to print. 29. Fri[day]. Rose and I left Leeds at 1.35 changed at York and arrived at Goathland at 4.30. 30. After dinner Rose &[and] I walked to Hunt House saw Mr Hill &[and] his family. He told me that he had no longer the shooting &[and] introduced me to the Keeper [117]

wrote to Wilfrid. 2. Tues[day]. Rose received a letter from Fanny to say they would come to day at 4.30 Shot Parus major &[and] P. trochilus. Uncle gave me a lesson in Bird painting on the former bird, I then tried again at the Pipit. At 4.30 we were at the station but the train did not come in until 5.45 when we saw our friends on their [122]

Aug[ust] way to Egton. Wilfrid brought me the Type- written Testimonials &c[et cetera] &[and] we arranged to walk to Egton tomorrow. At 2.0 Rose &[and] I set off for Egton via Beck Hole, saw Bullfinch in the wood On the moor we saw a Lapwing rise &[and] soon settle again, it walked lame &[and] I thought it was 'shamming' I got within 15 yards &[and] shot it dead with the Walking Stick (in the head)

Aug[ust] Bowling included) went to Arncliffe woods. Left at 8.0 &[and] arrived at Goath- land at 9.30 - having arranged to go again on Fri[day]. 4 Thur[sday]: Letter from McPherson

Aug[ust] and a little music we set off for Goathland Fanny &[and] Wilfrid accompanying us as far as Grosmont whence we walked to Goathland by the railway. [shorthand notation] 8. Mon[day] Wet day. During the whole of the morning&[and] afternoon I painted at the Lapwing. In the evening I prepared the Test- -timonial copies. [135]

Aug[ust]. 19. Fri[day]. Letter from Wilfrid enclosing a young Whinchat. In the evening Rose &[and] I had a stroll to Meanwood &c[et cetera]. 20. Sat[urday]. Aug[ust]. 22 Mon[day]: As soon as I got to Museum I found a telegram awaiting me from Grosmont. "Meet 9.50 train if possible - Fallowfield broken into. Fanny" Met train Fanny came alone. Went to Fallowfield. Key at Sheepscar Police Station which I fetched, entered the house by the back door where the thieves had [157]

gained entry a jemmy had been tried on the door in 2 or 3 places but failing a panel had been taken out when the locks &[and] bolts were easily reached the door at the top of the cellar steps had been bolted, and a panel had been taken out of the wooded partition &[and] the door opened. [158]

Aug[ust] Almost all the rooms had been ransacked from the cellar to the attics. The only instrument which was used appeared to be a chisel with this drawers had been forced open, and where the separating partitions could not be raised the locks had given way by the screws coming [159]

out. All the drawers had been taken out of the chests, &[and] were laid on the floors the contents being strewn about all over the place A very large amount of valuable jewellery &[and] plate had been taken plated goods had been left - the former contents of certain rooms were found in [160]

Aug[ust] other, every little box, wood or cardboard had been wrenched open, likewise numerous odd purses. 2 cash- boxes (the usual metal <open> ones) had been opened with evident ease the locks had stood but the solder had given. No articles of clothing except linen had been [161]

taken, packages of music had their covers torn off even a jam pot cover was torn off but the jam untouched the wines in the sideboard which was otherwise all turned about the floor were untouched as was also the beer barrel. Ornaments con- taining rose [162]

Aug[ust] leaves had had their contents scattered about the floor no doubt for expected concealed treasures but the ornaments were uninjured top of tables which might have contained secret drawers were wrenched off &[and] every little art cabinet or other probable receptacle forced [163]

open - there had been no attempt to pick any lock the chisel had simply been in- -serted &[and] wrenched but there had not been any "malicious" damage. We spent all the morning in cram- ming everything to hand into the drawers with -out any reference to the drawer or room from which [164]

Aug[ust]. they had been taken so dreadful was the carnage and we succeeded in making the place - outwardly - look something like its former self. We made a rough list of what could remembered to have been lost I went for the joiner to make good the damage to the panels and [165]

cabinets &[and] tables &c[et cetera] &[and] then to the Dective\*[Detective] Office - the Police having the matter already in hand. Returned to Fallowfield (Fanny having gone into a neighbour's house) When we finished our work Mrs Jno[John] Bowling of Heckmondwike called. Left the house Fanny went for some [166]

Aug[ust]. refreshment while I to Museum I saw her off to Egton at 5:30. Had I not been in the house I could not have conceived that it was possible to effect such wreckage <h>as must have been done in the short time the thieves would occupy the house. Called again at [167]

the Town Hall &[and] wrote to Fanny with the latest particulars. 23. <Wed> Tues[day]. Roebuck sent me proofs of Nat[uralist] from Boot via Carnforth where he is staying I wrote &[and] sent in with proofs a note on Vespertilio mystacinus at Goathland. Visited Fallowfield screwed on locks &[and] otherwise fastened up the [168]

Aug[ust]. drawers Backhouse called &[and] told me that he had a week-old sow. Wrote to Mrs Bland and also to Fanny. 24<Thur>Wed[nesday] A. Stuart sent Sterna fluviatilis which I posted to Loten to mount for him. <The detective> Letter from Fanny enclosing further list of articles which I left at the detective office corrected final proofs [169]

of Naturalist at night. J.A. Reid called &[and] I asked him to dinner on Saturday. 25 Thur[sday]. One of my Triton cristatus died to day. Mr J Lowther spent <the> an hour with me in the evening. 26 Fri[day]. Two detectives called &[and] I went with them to Fallowfield During my absence cousin W[illiam].R.T[aylor] Carr called &[and] left word [170]

Aug[ust]. that he would call later but he did not do so. 27 Sat[urday] J.A. Reid came to dinner and we afterwards went for a walk to Adel &[and] Meanwood. Found larvae if H. pisi -

Returned to tea, when he left at 8.20. 28 Sun[day] Spent all the morning in painting Cotinga cayana. In the evening Rose &[and] I walked over to Horsforth. [171]

29 Mon[day]. Attended L[eeds].N[aturalists'].C[lub] Council at 7.30. Letter from Fanny to say they would be home at 5 tomorrow. 30 Tues[day]. Rose came down at 4.0 and we went to Fallowfield. She remained there while I met the train at 5.5 Spent the remainder of the evening at Fallowfield. 31. Wed[nesday]. Detective called &[and] I referred him to [172]

Aug[ust] - Sep[tember] Fallowfield. At 2.50 I met Rose's Uncle (John Green) and Aunt &[and] Cousin (Percy) of Oldham from Harrogate where they are staying, they went to Ashfield &[and] remained until 9.0 when I 'set them'! to Headingley station. Mrs Hargreaves &[and] Fanny came up in a carriage and took Rose for a drive. During the evening I made a frame for Wilfrid 11. Sun. Painted at [179]

in the morning - wet day, did not go out. Spent the evening in Pencil drawings - Originals for "Peter Schlemihl &[and] copied Thornburn's strix flammea in Lord Lilfords' Birds. 12. Mon[day]: Recommenced to go home to dine. Letter from Rev[erend] R[ichar]d. Collins asking me to give a lecture at Kirk Burton some Tuesday in November the 1st [180]

Notes on the Vivarium Went to Meanwood &[and] obtained some leaf mould this I put into the Vivarium together with a small shallow tin of water Lacerta vivifiara. Was extremely and rushed all about the place attempting to get out and acting very much as Vipera berus had done. It did not attempt to hide itself in the mould. Next morning [187]

it was not to be seen and I found under the decayed leaves, I noticed that its right fore foot was missing, evidently an old accident as the stump presented a knobbed appearance. Auguis pagilis. On being put with the Vivarium it at once buried itself, in the mould and did not reappear. It is I think a female and [188]

is not of "almost equal thickness throug -hout" as stated by Bell. Its body seems to be very swollen and would foster the idea of pregnancy did not the time of year tend to dispel such thoughts Next day the reptile was generally laid upon the leaves or heather, a small bit of which I put into the case [189]

Triton cristatus. I put in the 2 which I had obtained at Harrogate as usual they moved but little, one crawled into the water and remained there some time. Rana temporaria. These two were very small their 'larval' tail not being wholly absorbed, they were extremely lively and jumped about in all directions quite [190]

regardless as to where they might land, they often got into the water by accident but soon scrambled out, on putting in a house fly one immediately caught it, but lost it again. About an hour after I had put them in one was dead and as I saw a Triton cristatus near it I thought that it might have been [191]

the culprit, but the fog did not appear to have been engulfed or otherwise damaged. AMS 587/27 [192]
